



# CHARLES ALEXANDER & HELEN CADBURY

1. Charles Alexander was \_\_\_\_\_ in East Tennessee in 1867.
2. His mother read sermons to the family every evening while her husband was away; Charles was converted when he was 13 years old.
3. Later in life he joined the famous p\_\_\_\_\_ R A Torrey and went all around the w\_\_\_\_\_ with the message of the Gospel
4. Charles Alexander wrote h\_\_\_\_\_. One of the most well-known was 'O that will be glory for me'. Interestingly it first became popular in A\_\_\_\_\_ and from there has travelled around the world.



5. In 1904 he came to E\_\_\_\_\_, and while here he met Helen Cadbury, the daughter of the 'Cadbury Ch\_\_\_\_\_ Company' president.

6. Helen was converted when she was 12 years old, and a year later she began a small club for g\_\_\_\_ called the 'Pocket Testament League.'

7. This league became a nationwide, and even a world-wide organisation.

8. During the First World W\_\_\_ the Pocket Testament League gave out 400,000 amongst the s\_\_\_\_\_ leaving for the war.

9. The PTL still exists today, and since its small beginnings in Bournville, B\_\_\_\_\_ it has distributed 100 m\_\_\_\_\_ pocket-sized Gospels.

10. Charles McCallon Alexander died in 1920 and is buried in Birmingham. Helen Cadbury Alexander died in 1969. Their home in Birmingham was called 'T\_\_\_\_\_':
