

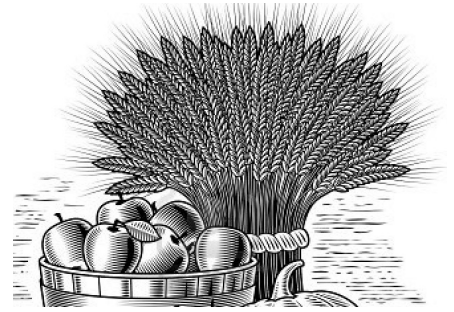
# The Work of Today



'..as the duty of everyday required..'

Ezra 3 v 4

1. This text comes from an account of the Jews keeping the Feast of the T\_\_\_\_\_ after they had returned from B\_\_\_\_\_.
2. It was held in October and was a Thanksgiving for the h\_\_\_\_\_. Presents were given, as we do at Ch\_\_\_\_\_.
3. It lasted for 8 days, and sacrifices were offered. Different s\_\_\_\_\_ were offered each day, e.g. On the 1st day 13 bullocks, on the 2nd day 12 bullocks ..... until 7 bullocks were offered on the 7th day.
4. The priest kept this r\_\_\_ and **did what was required for every d\_\_**. This is a good principle for life.

6. If we do what is required each day, 'in its day' we will be much h\_\_\_\_\_ people.
